# METHODOLOGY

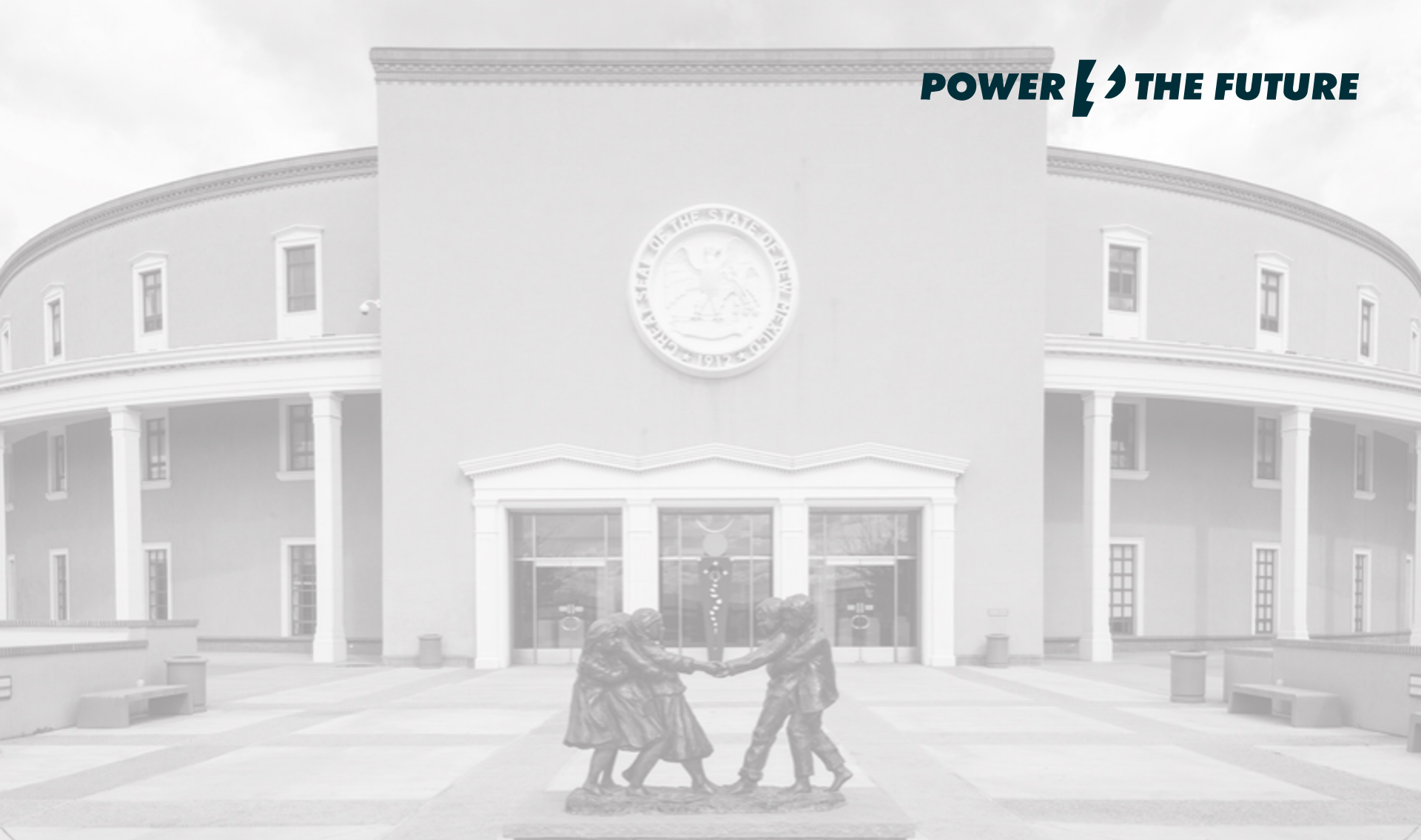
On behalf of Power The Future, Public Opinion Strategies completed a survey of 500 registered/likely voters in New Mexico.

One-hundred and twenty-five respondents were contacted via landline and 375 via cell phone.

The survey was conducted January 5th-8th, 2024 and has a margin of error of +4.38%.

Neil Newhouse was the primary researcher on this project. Tommy Dow was the project director and Jackson Ellis and Zach Cooper provided analytical support.

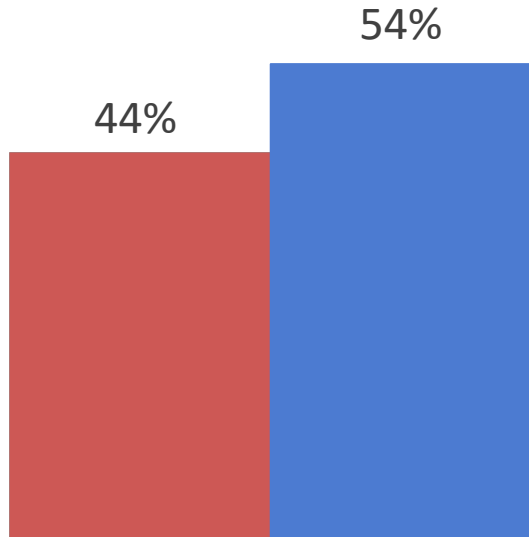




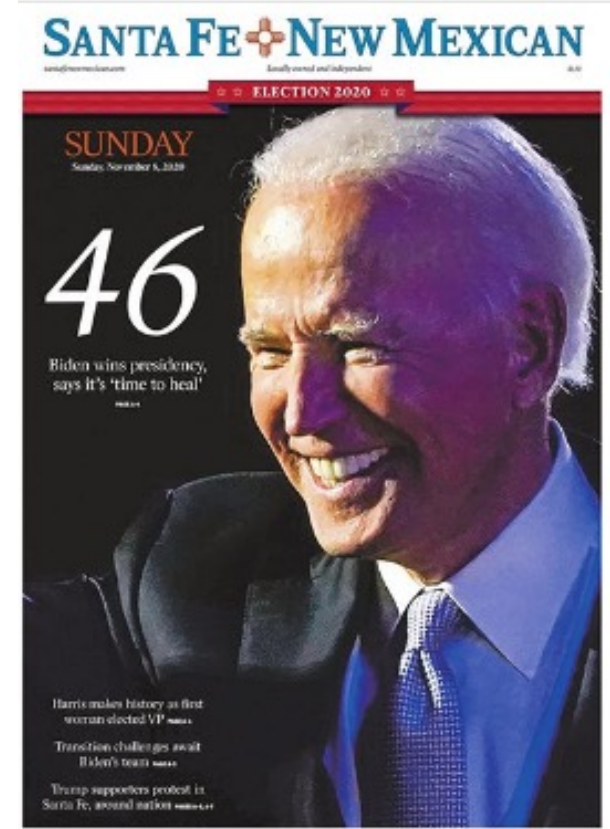

# Remember President Biden's big victory in the state in 2020?

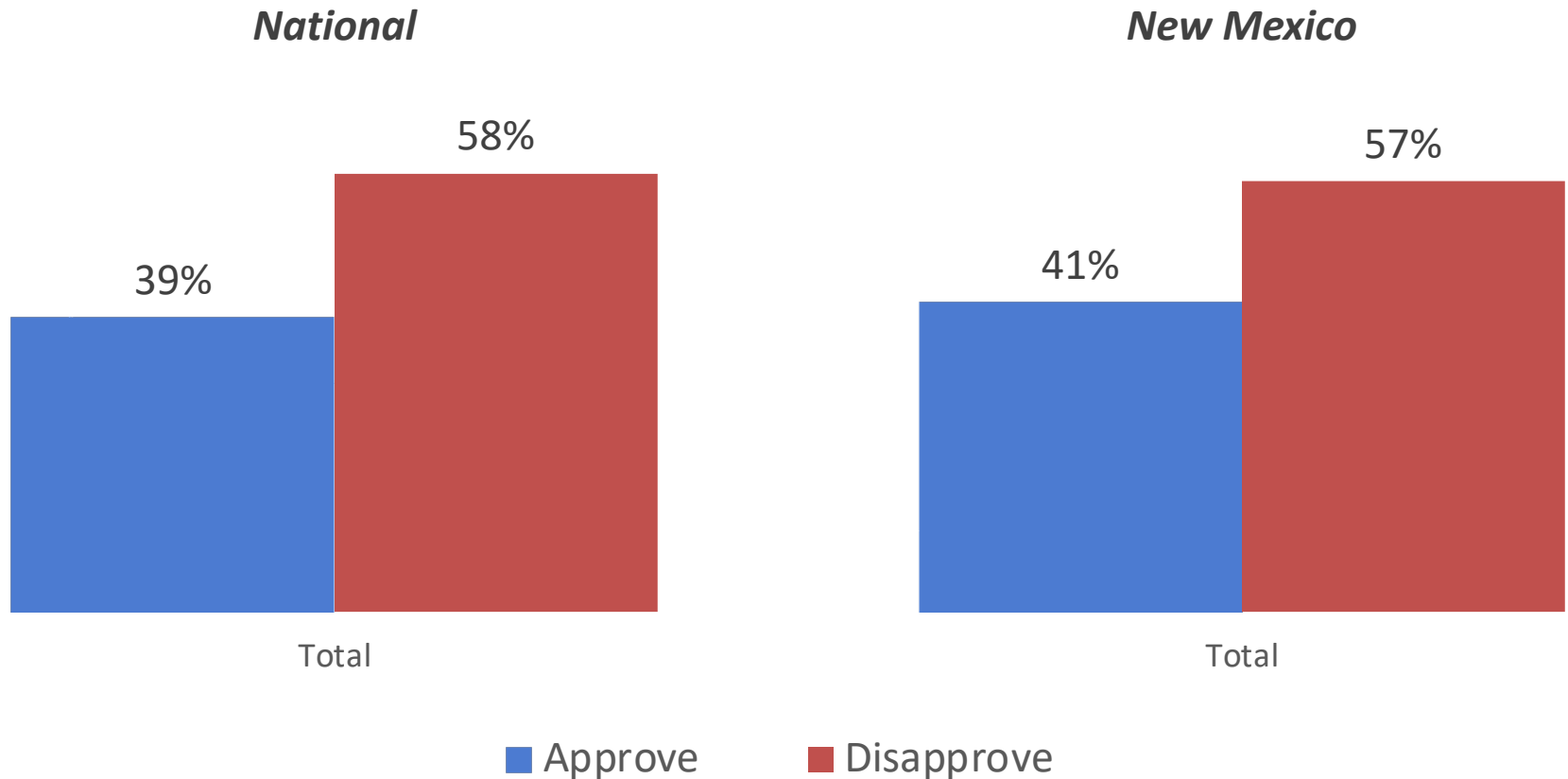
## New Mexico 2020 Results

# 2024 is not 2020. In the most Hispanic state in the country, Biden's approval has sunk close to overall national numbers.



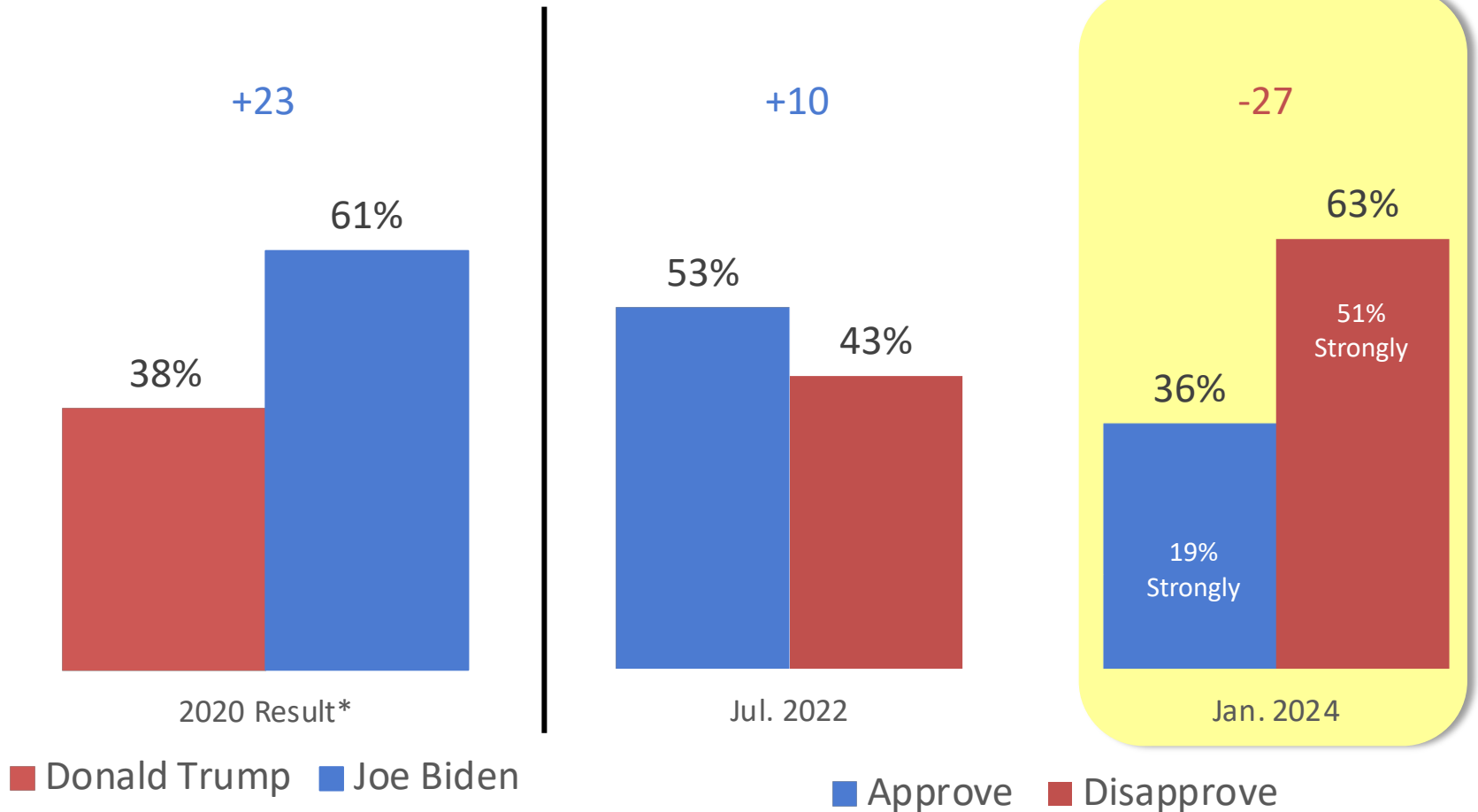

Among New Mexico Hispanic Voters



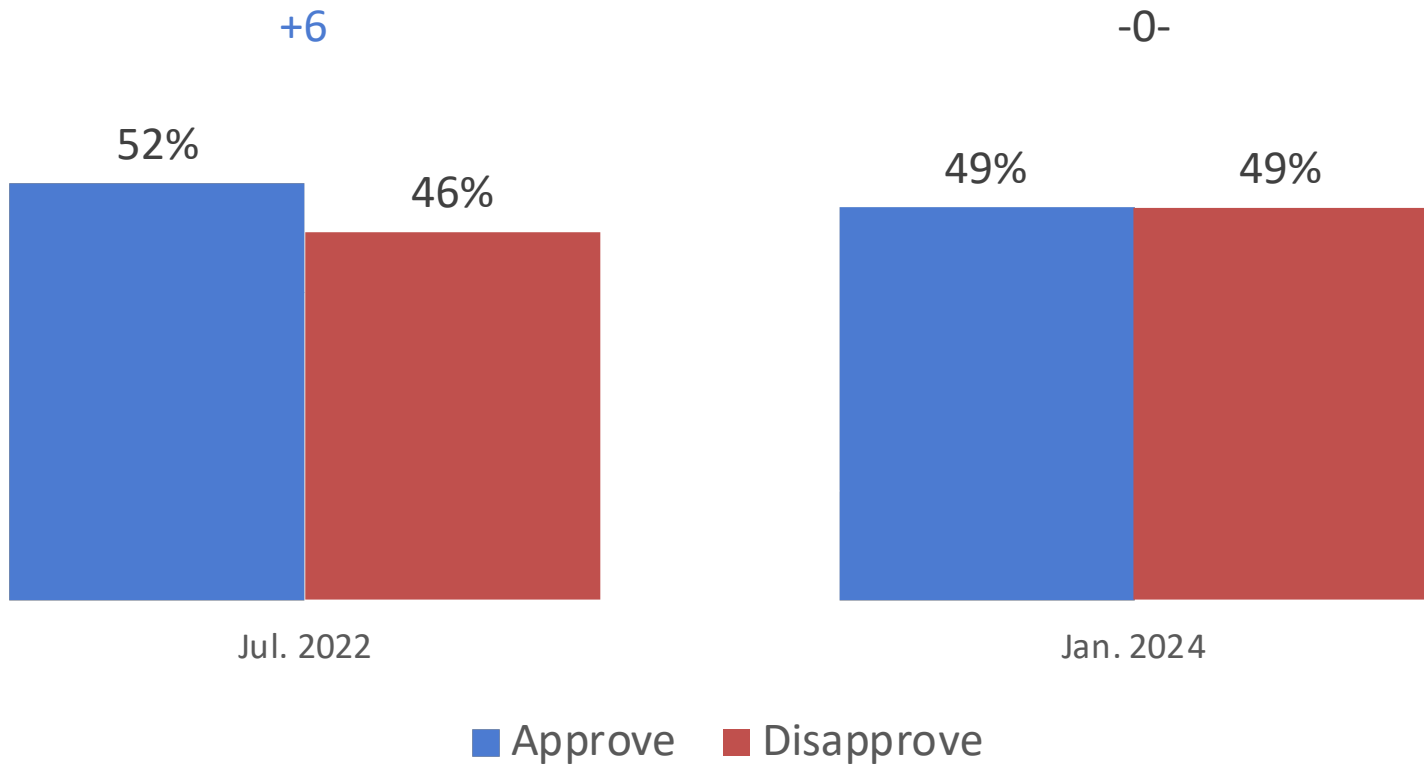

# Governor Lujan Grisham's approval rating has also slipped a notch over the past year.

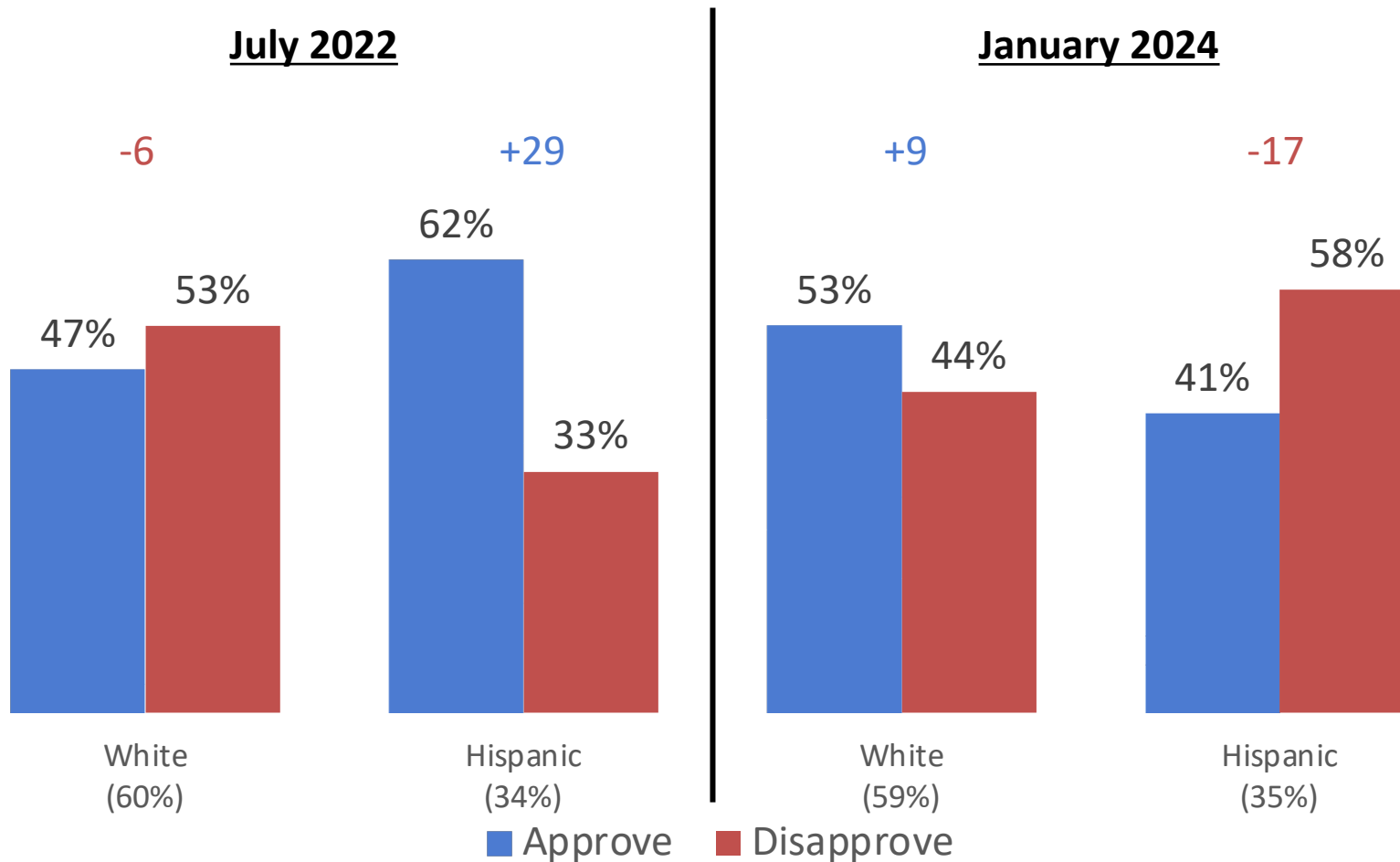

## Governor Lujan Grisham Approval

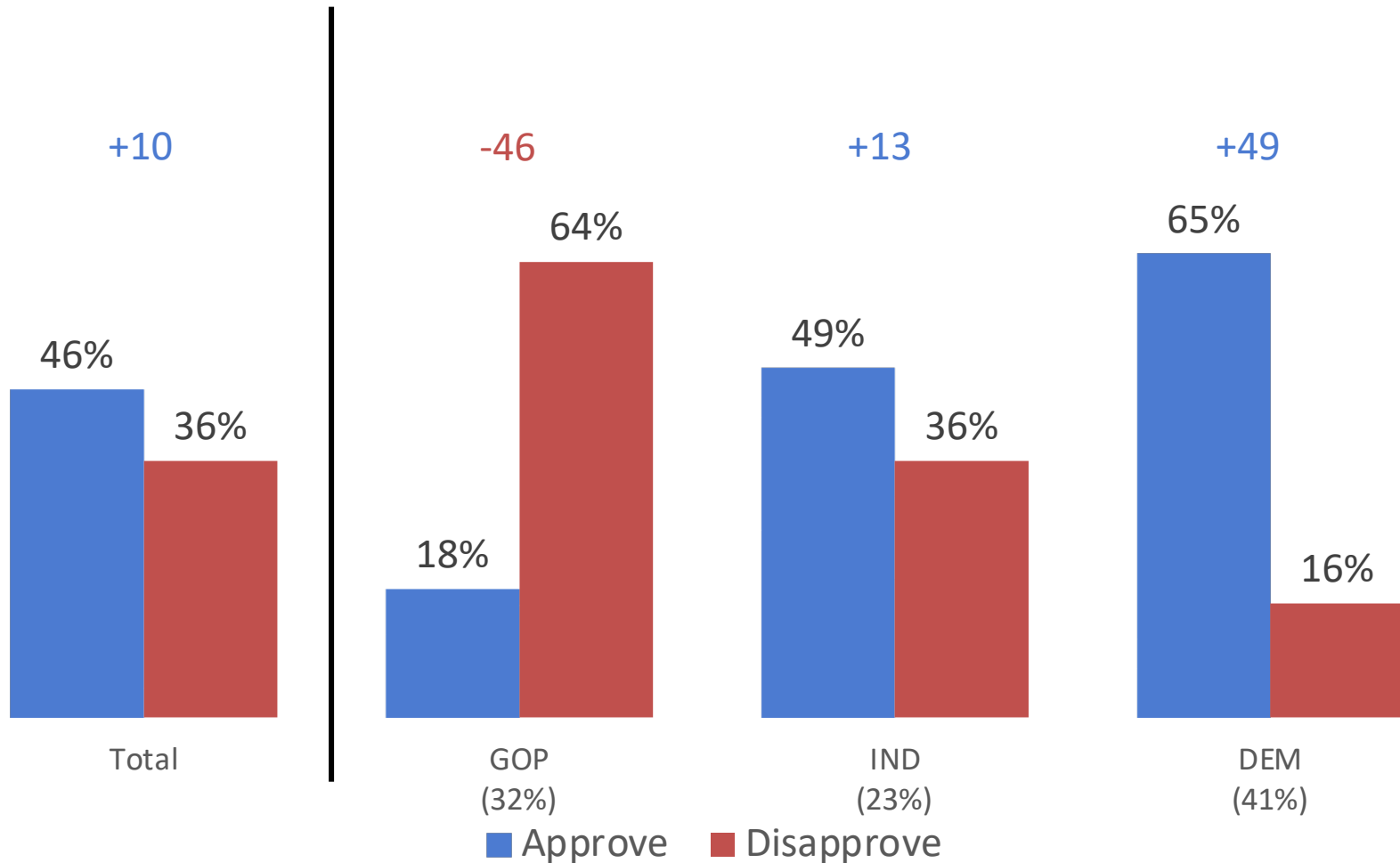

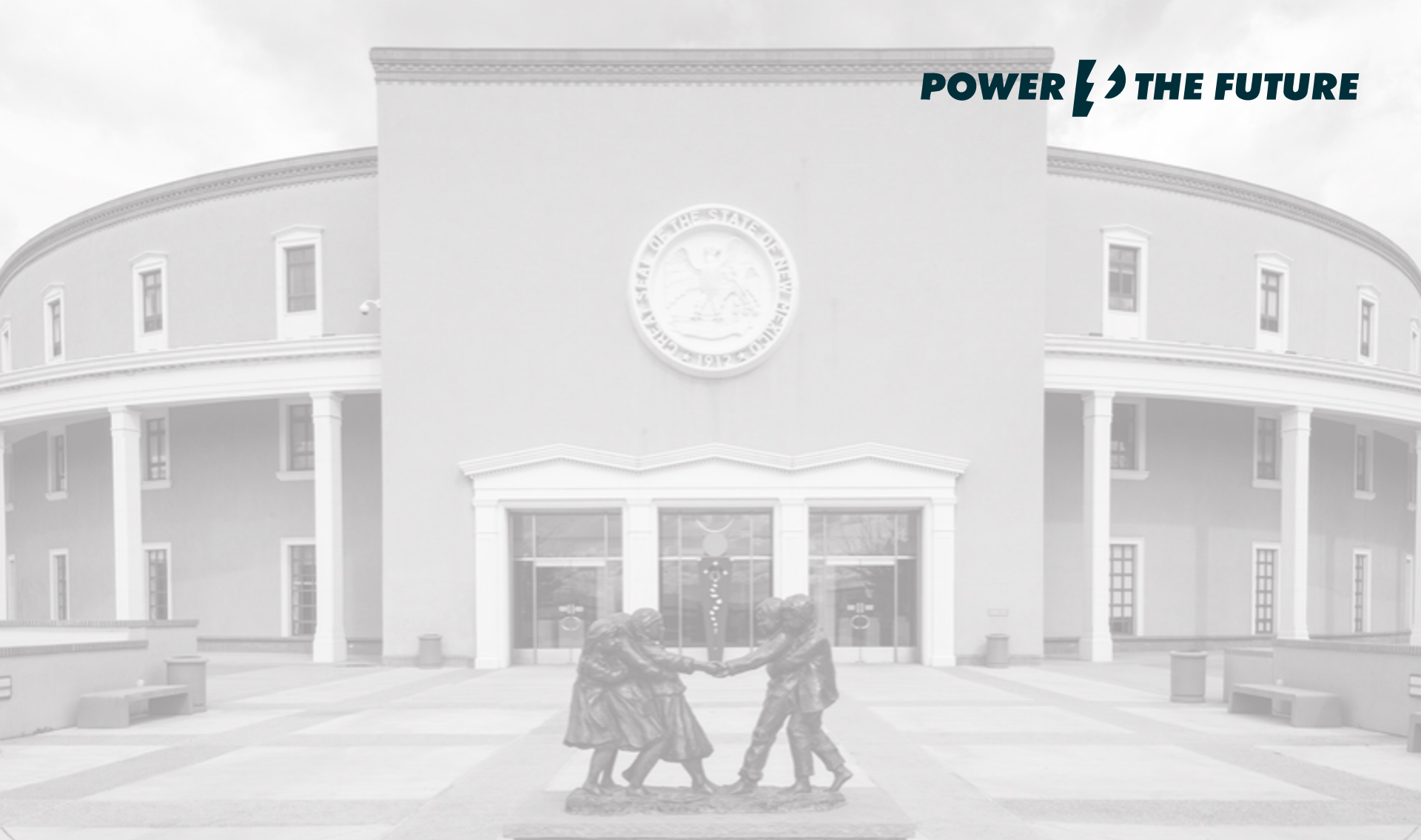




# Despite the Governor's mixed job approval scores, New Mexico voters approve of the job the state legislature is doing.

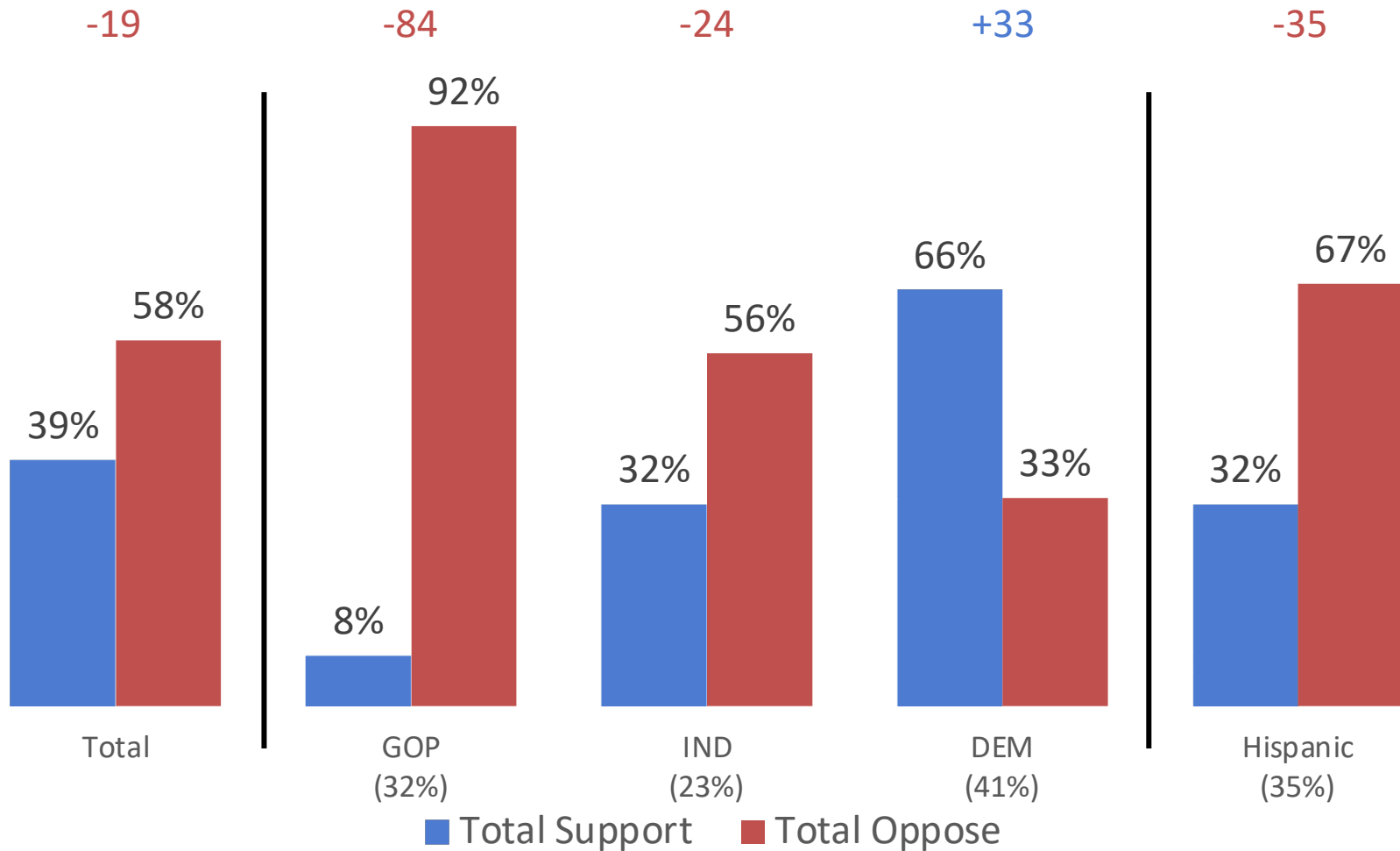


And, do you approve or disapprove of the job the New Mexico State Legislature is doing in Santa Fe?

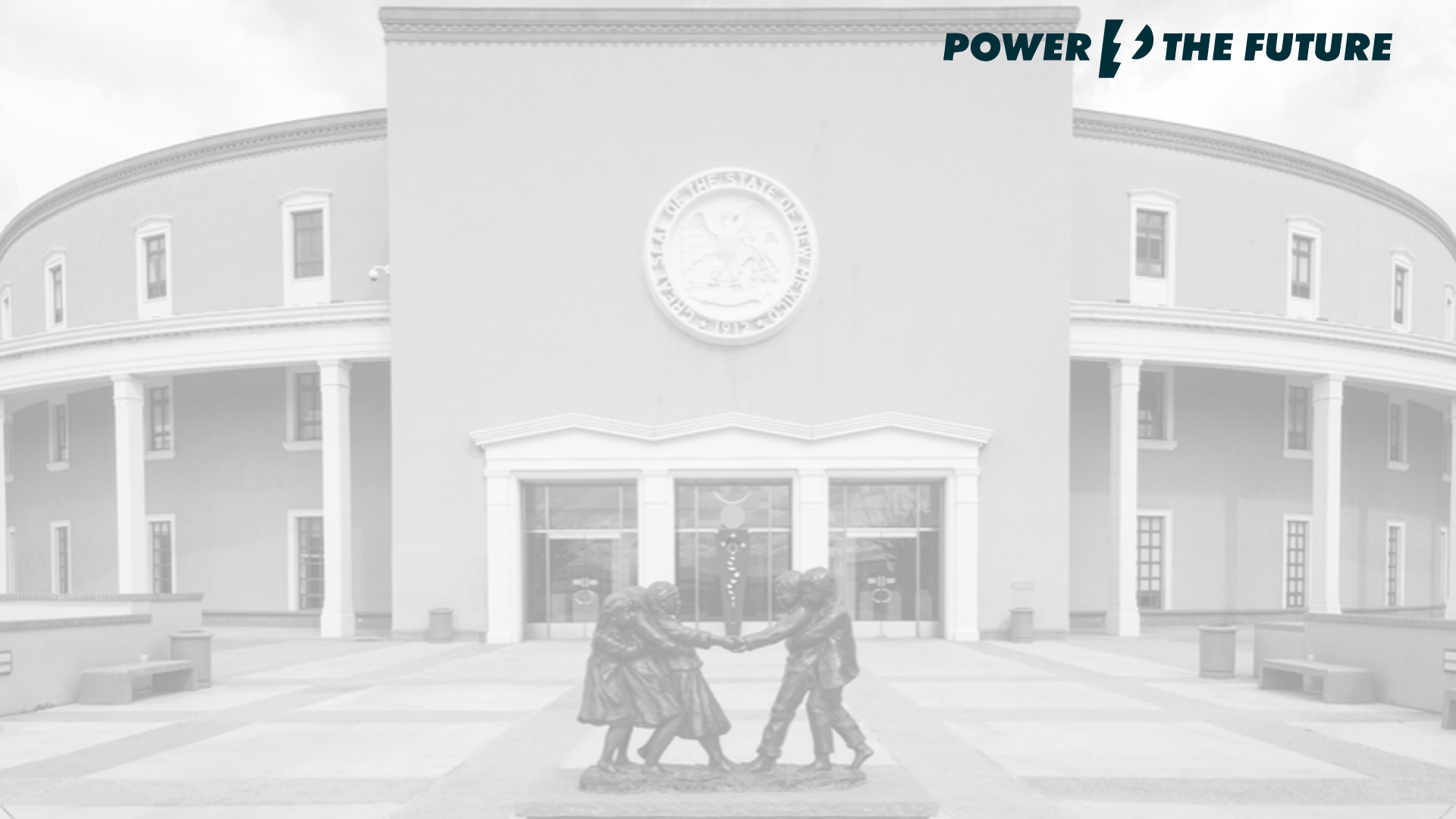


# **New Mexico's Issues: Guns**

# New Mexico voters oppose the actions taken by Governor Lujan Grisham prohibiting the carrying of open and concealed weapons in public areas.

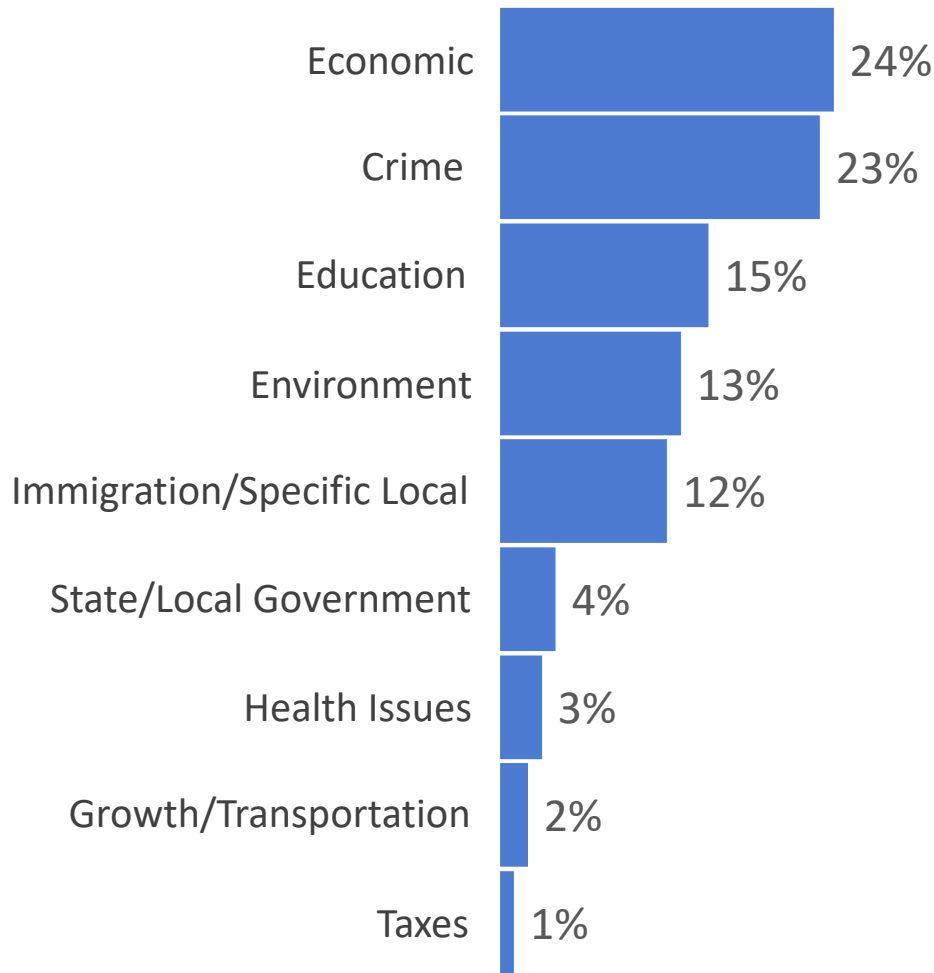

# Economic issues, crime, education and immigration top the list of concerns of New Mexico voters.

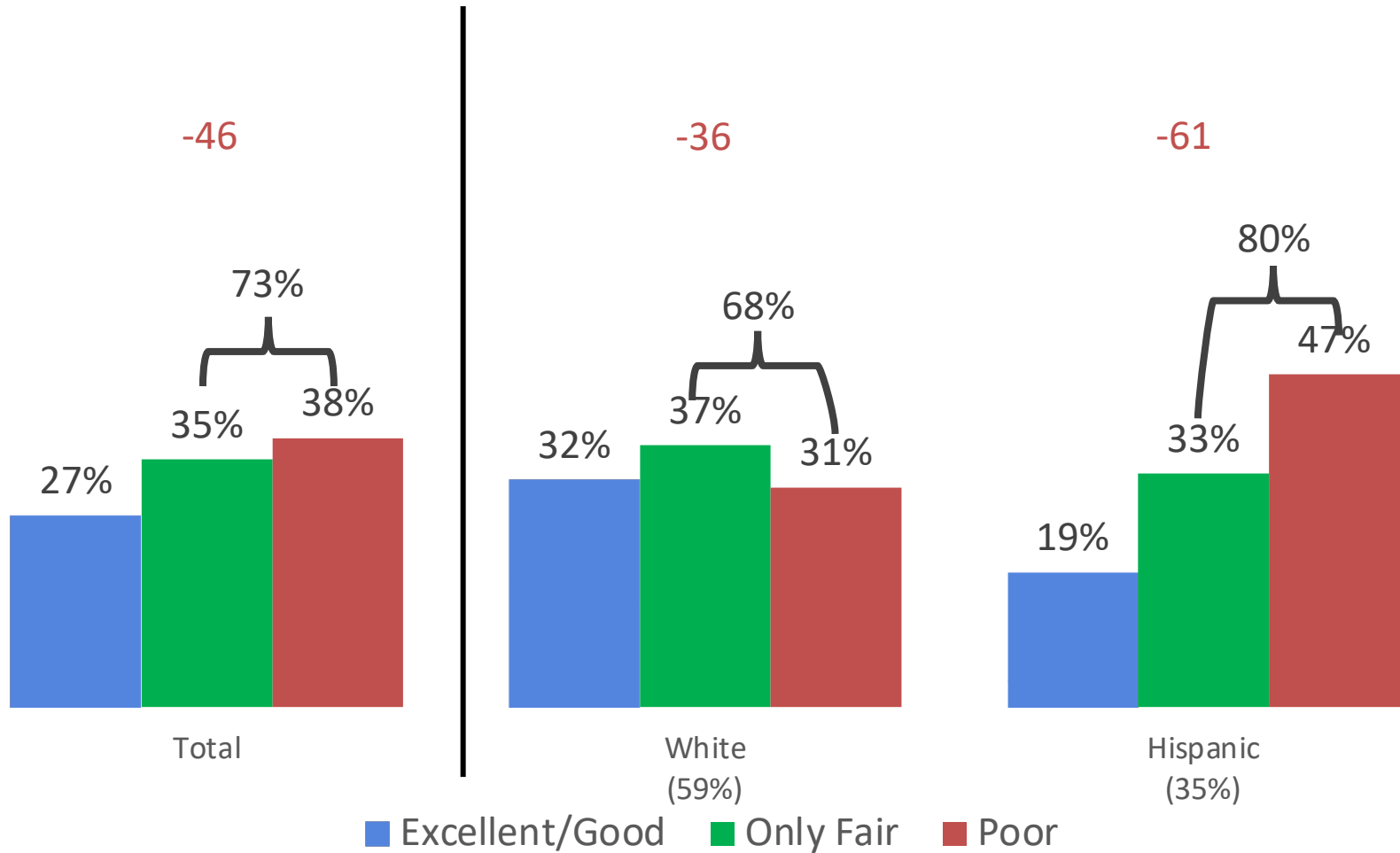

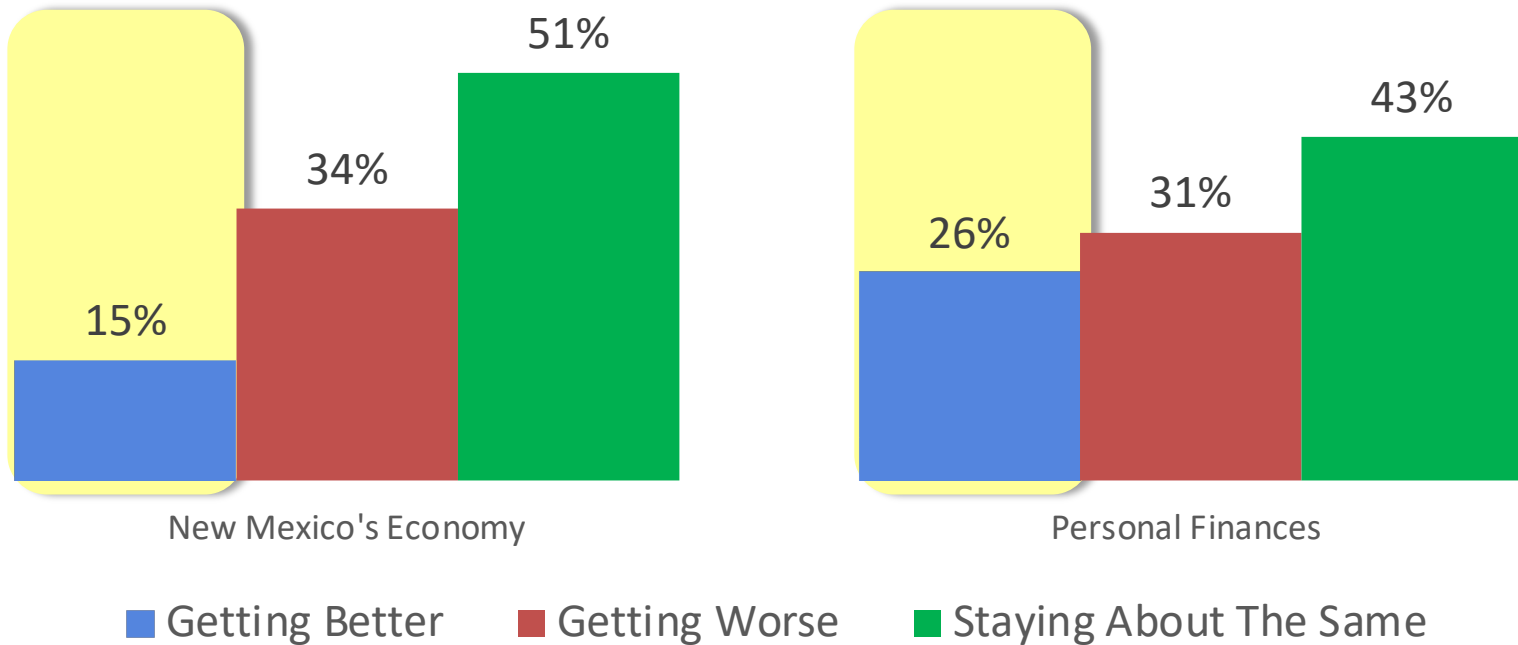


Changing topics, what would you say is the most important problem facing the state that you would like the state's political leaders to address over the next couple of years?

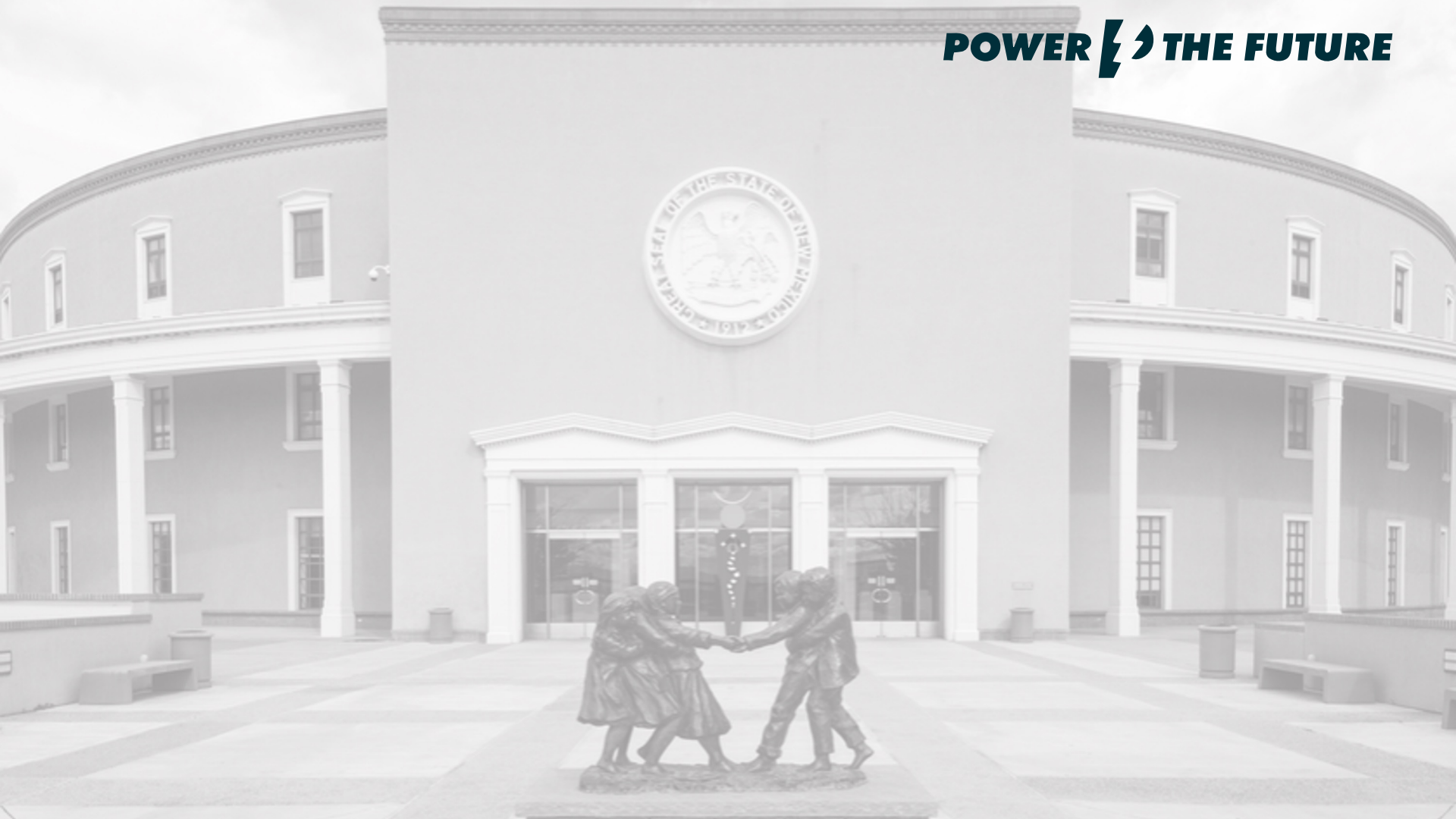
# Nearly three-fourths of New Mexico's voters rate the state's economy as "only fair" to "poor."



And, only 15% believe the state's economy is getting better, while 26% say their personal economy has gotten better.



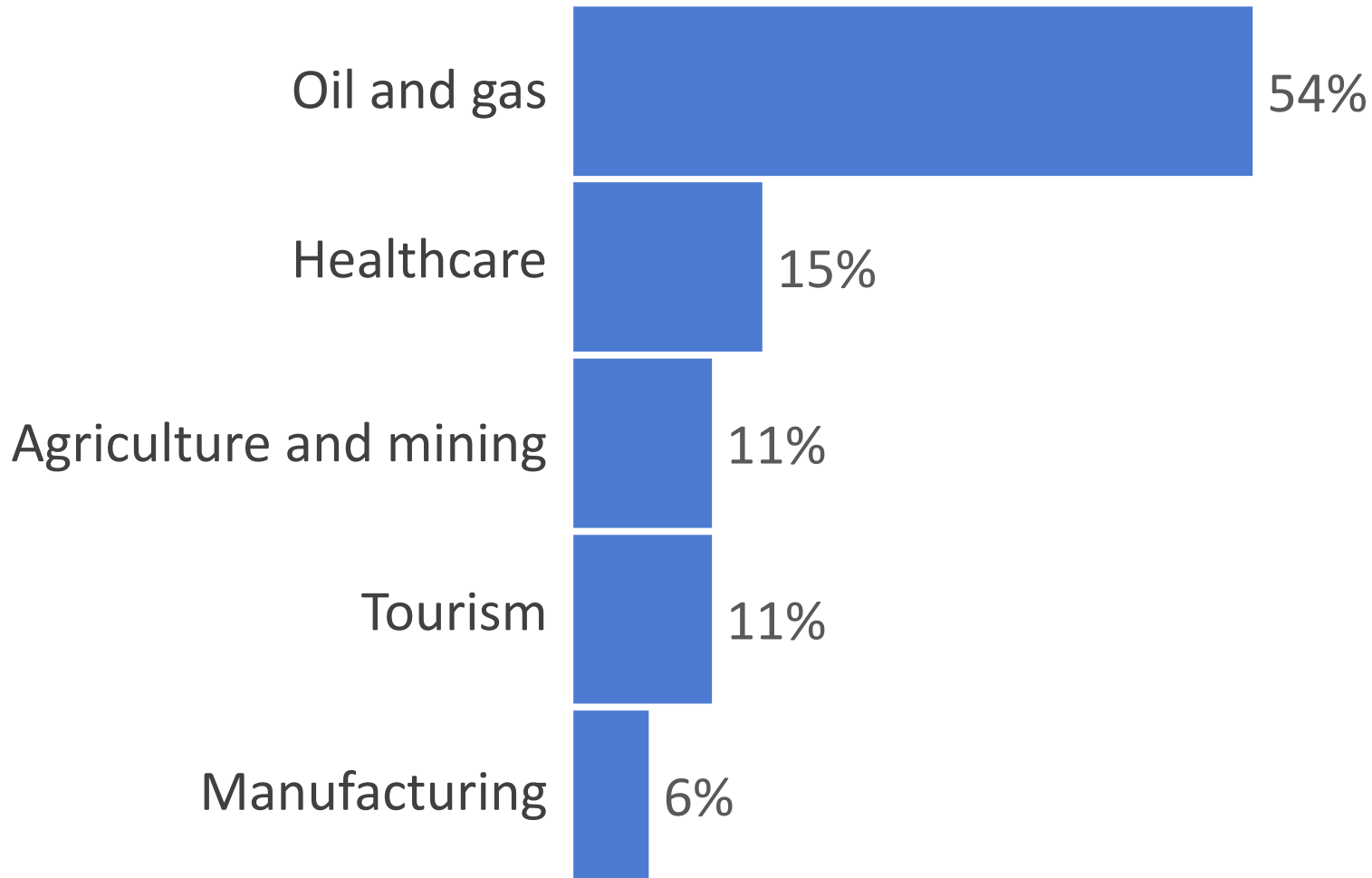
Would you say that New Mexico's economy is excellent, good, only fair or poor?

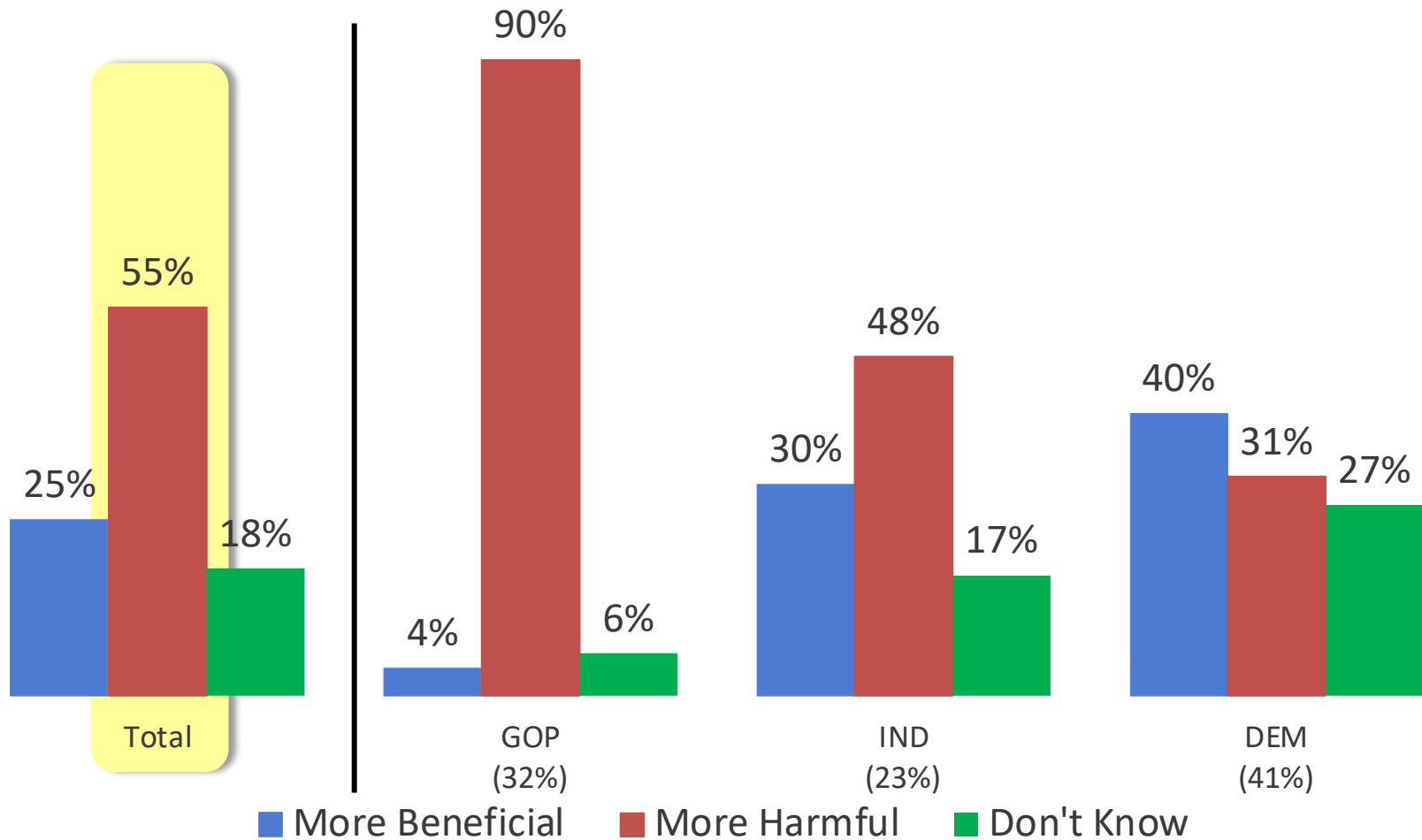


# There is no question which industry is most important to the state's economy – oil and gas.

# Yet, a majority of New Mexicans believe that the Governor's policies have been more harmful to the state's oil and gas industry.



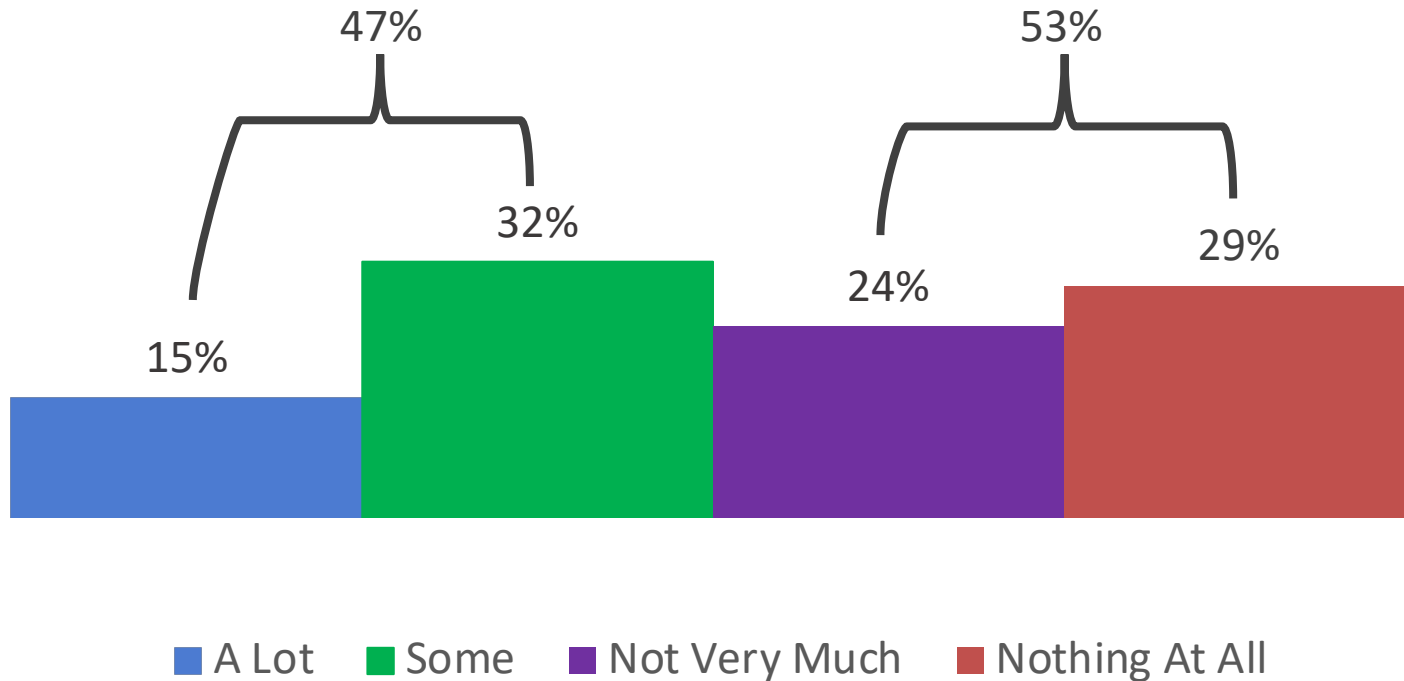
And, do you believe that Governor Lujan Grisham's policies have generally been more beneficial or more harmful to the oil and gas industry in the state?

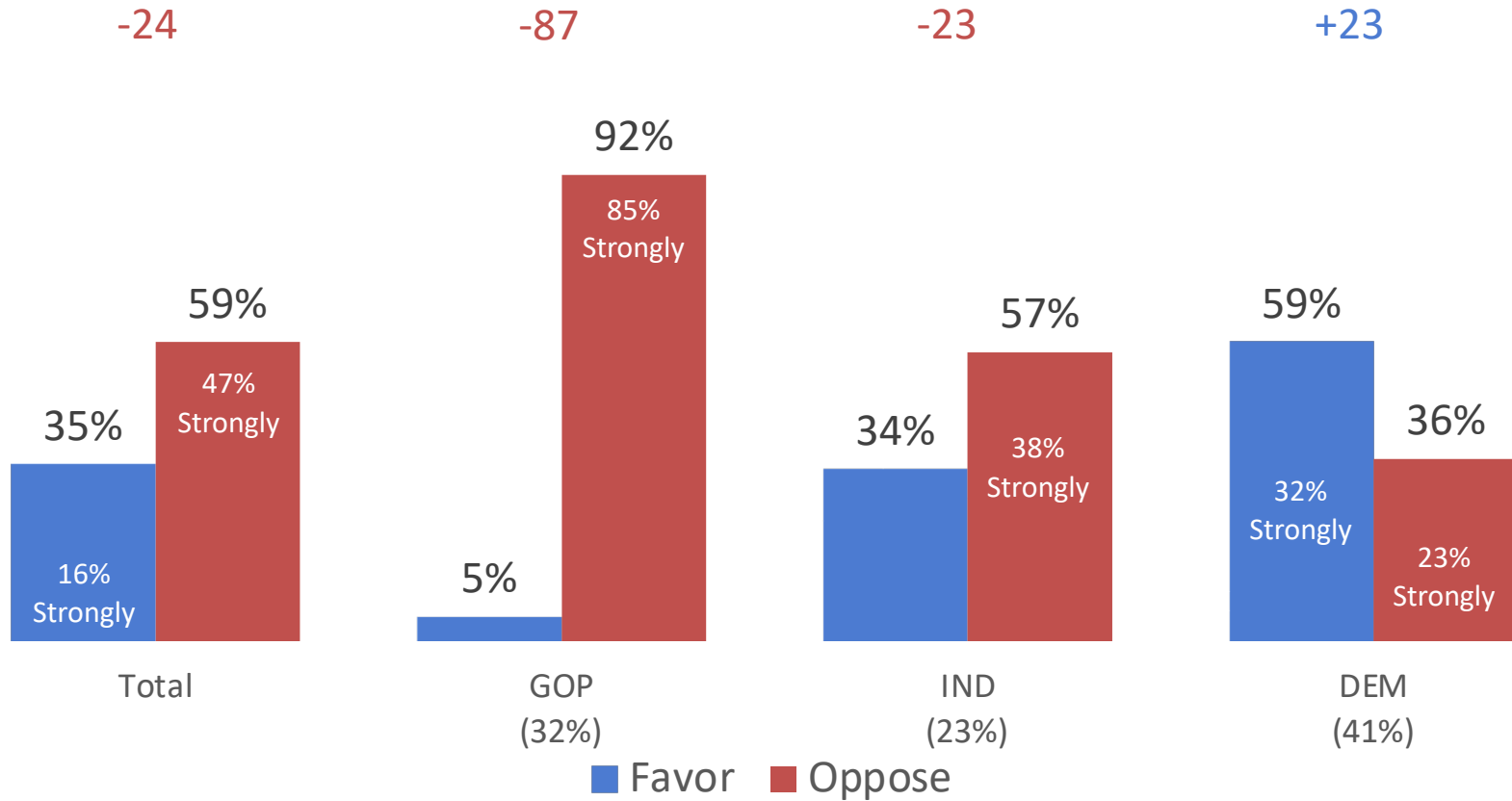


# Only about half of New Mexico voters say they've heard a lot or some about it...

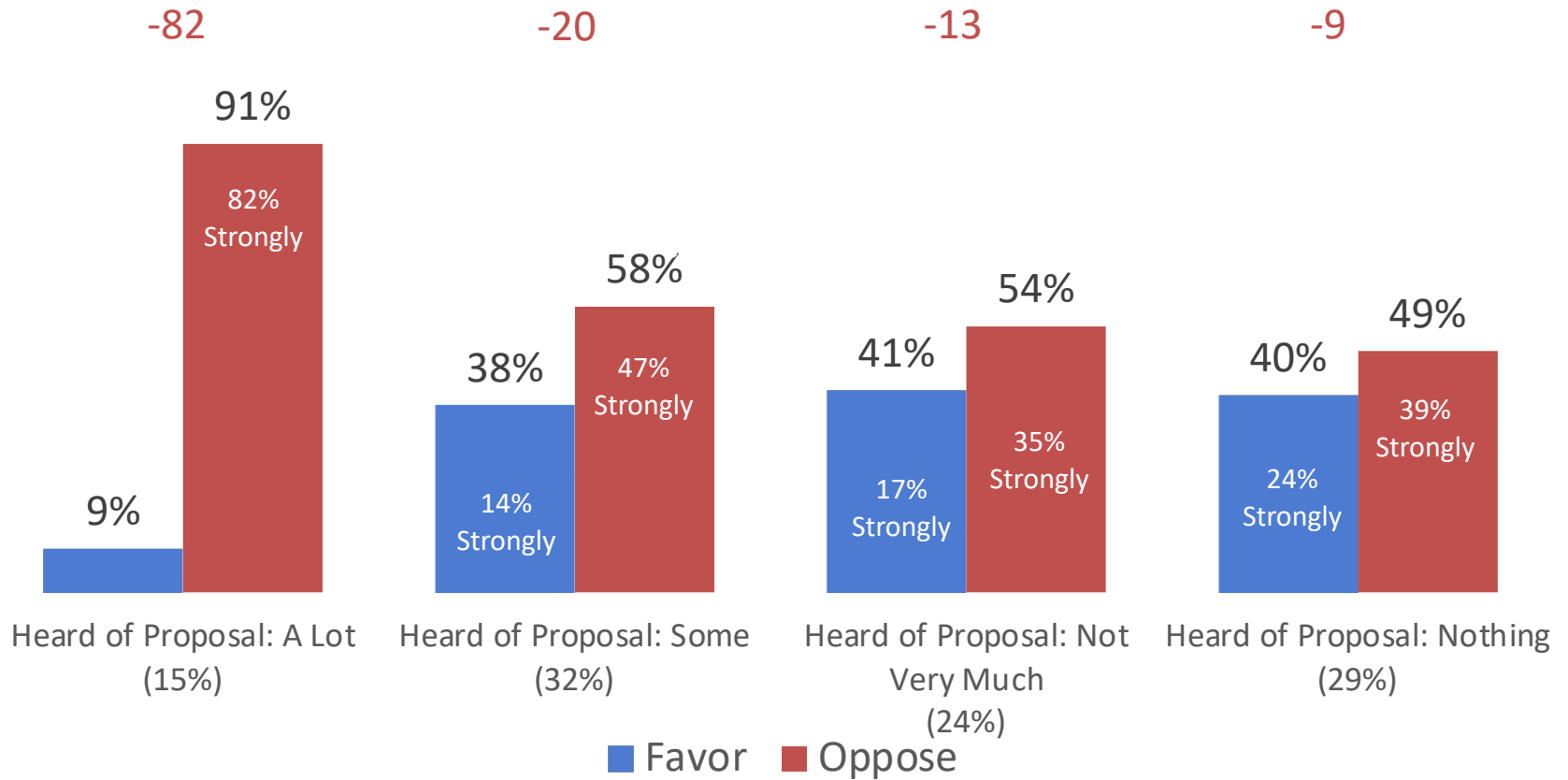

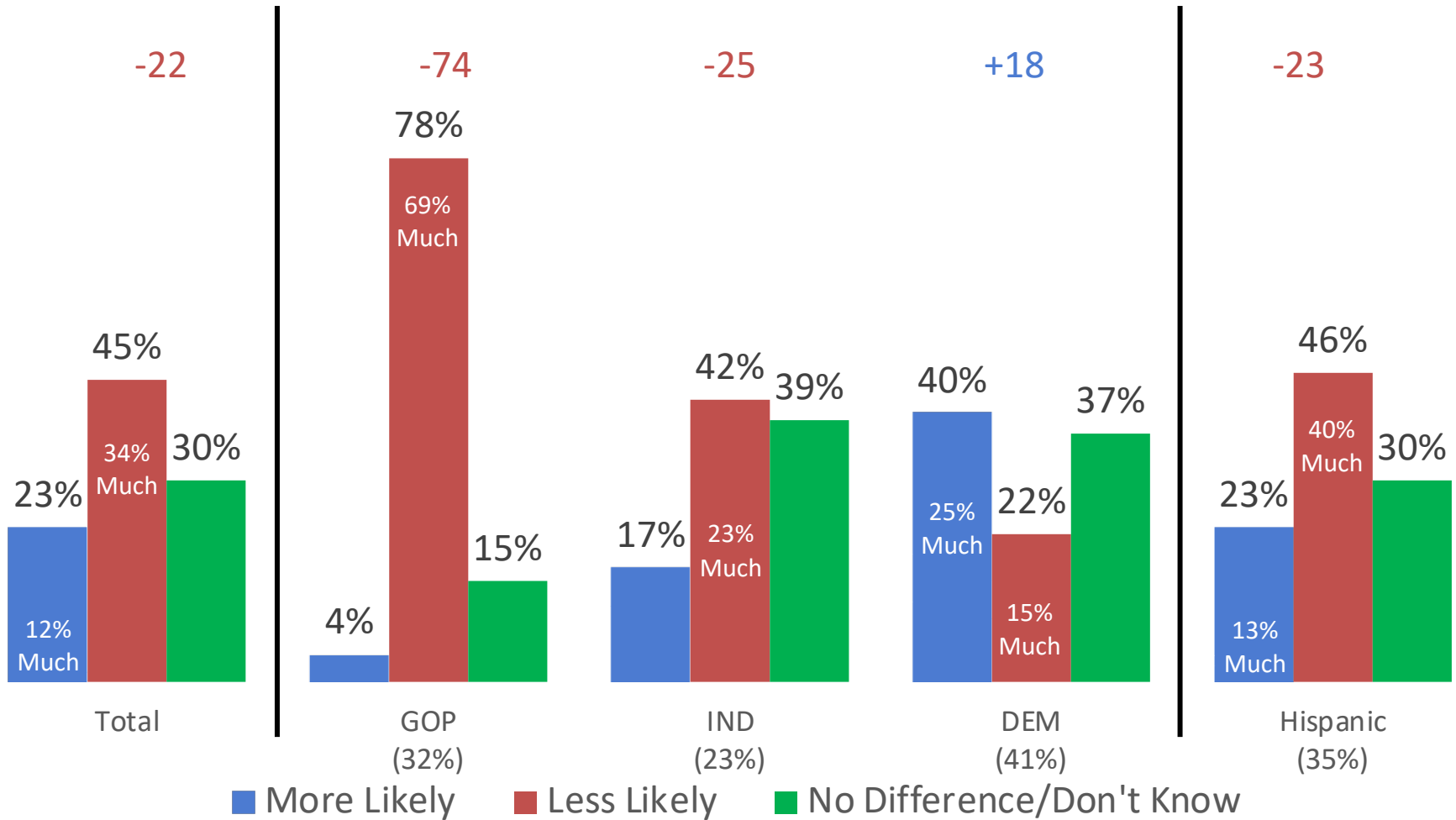
But, overall, a clear majority oppose it.



# Those voters who have heard the most about the proposal are most strongly in opposition to it.

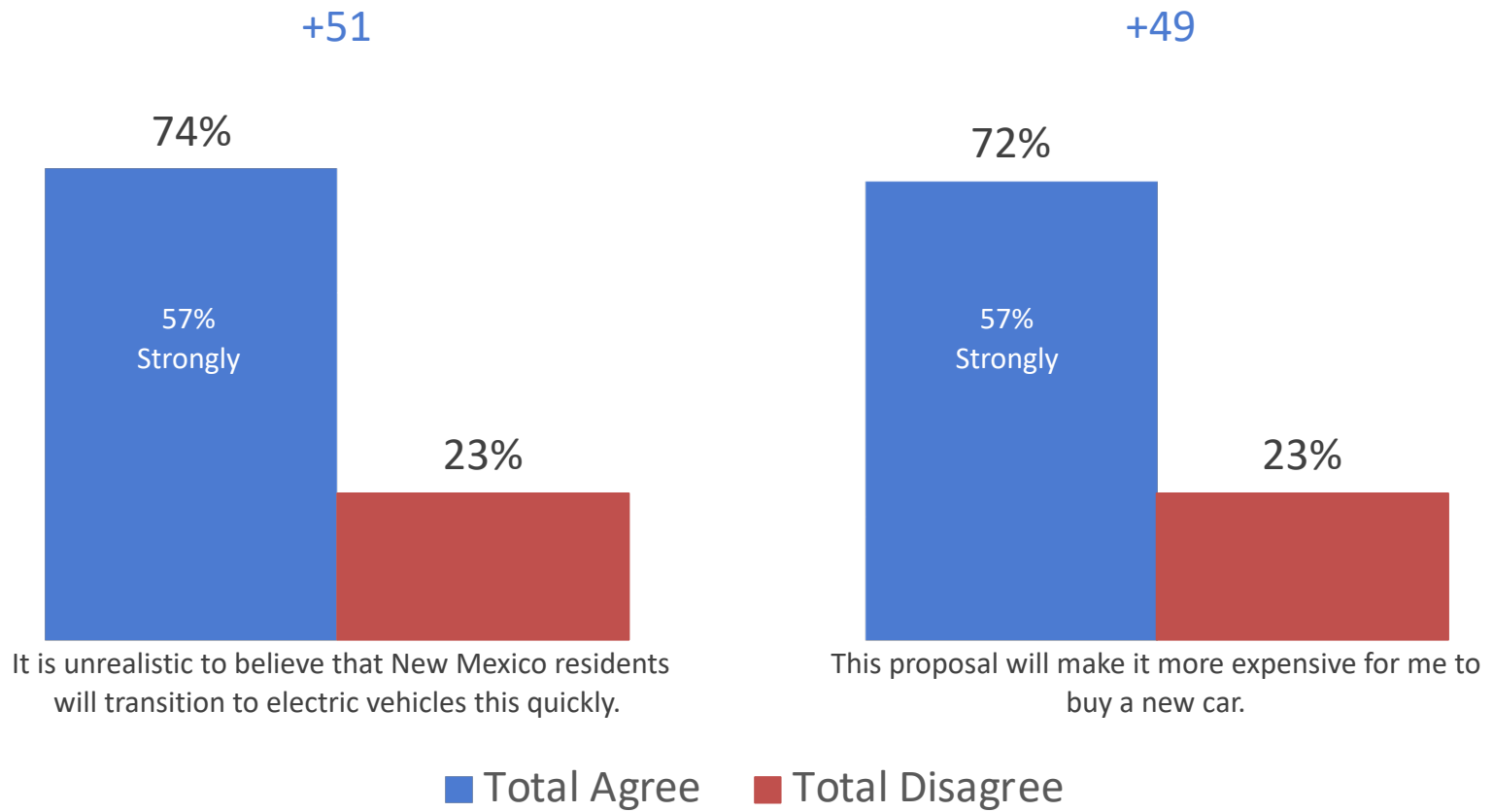


# By a wide margin, voters say they would be less likely to vote for a state legislator who supported this proposal.

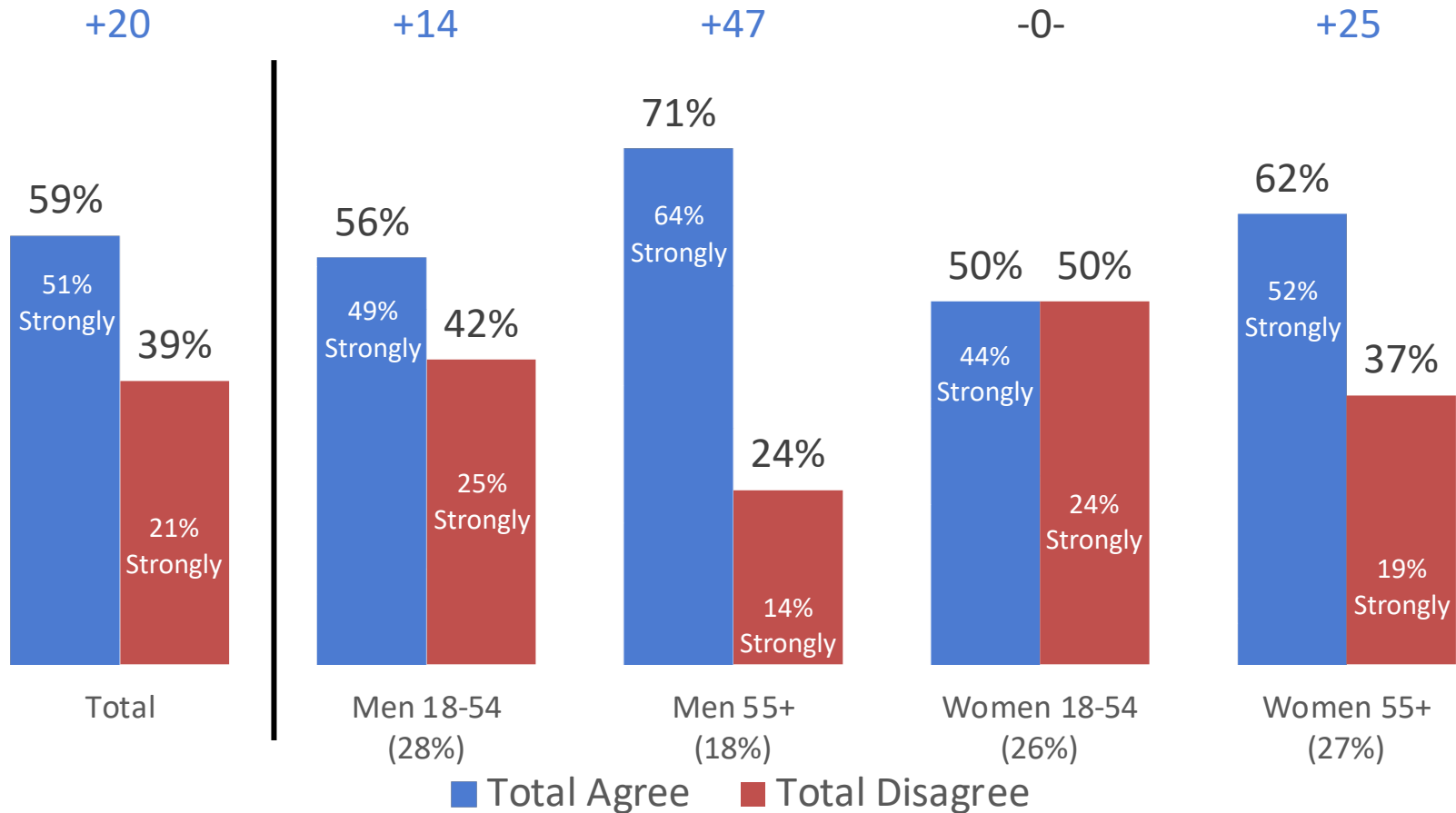

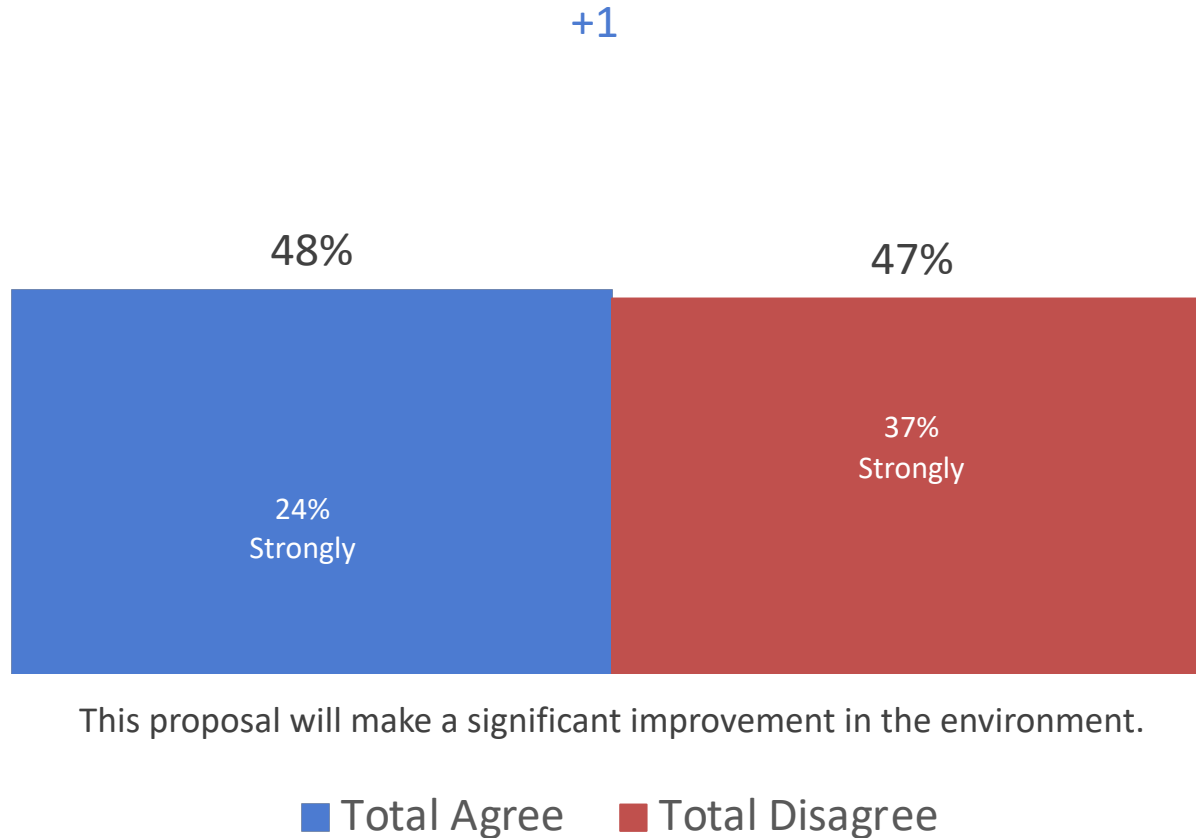

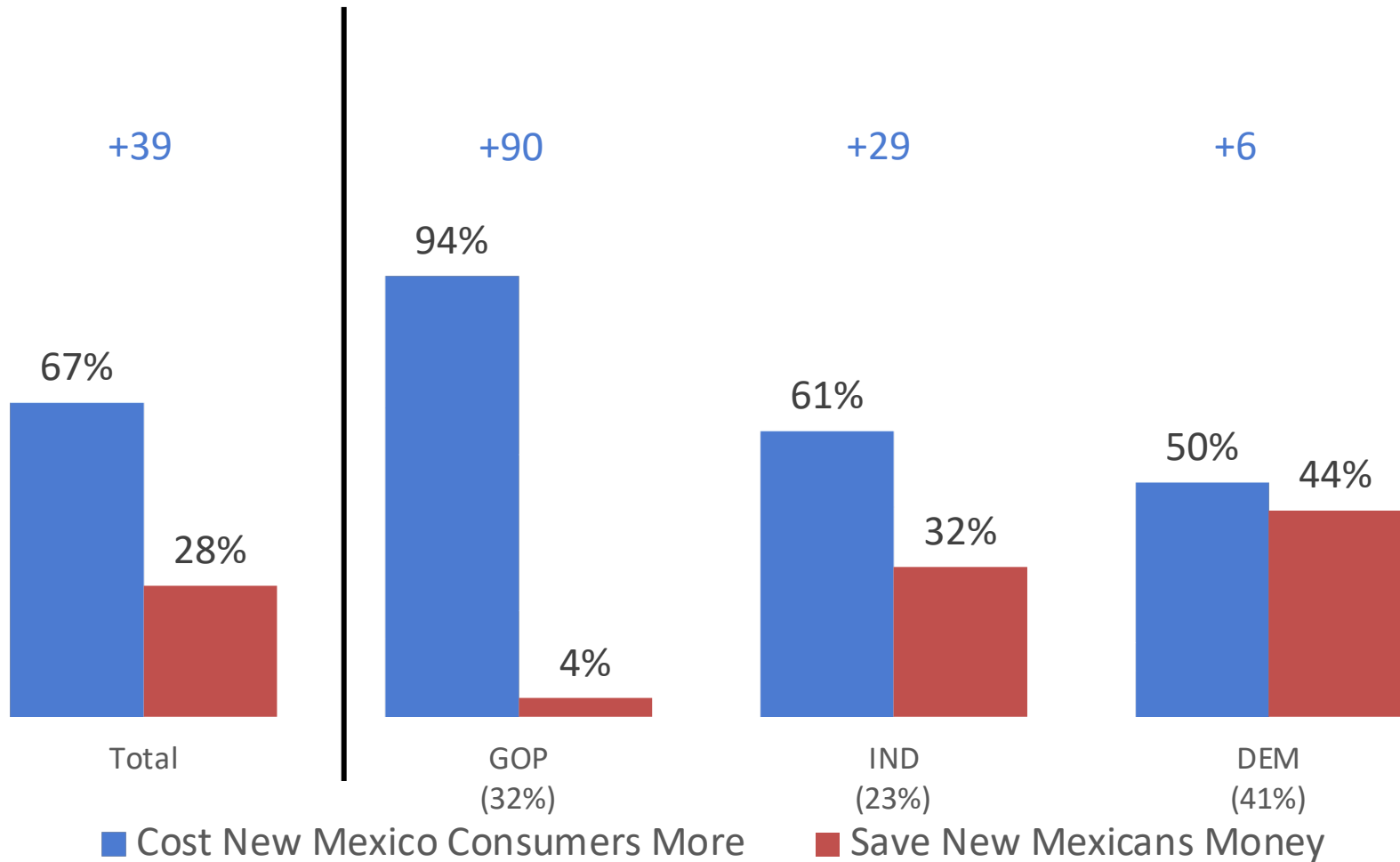

Do you believe that in the long run, this proposal will cost New Mexico consumers more or do you believe it will save New Mexicans money?

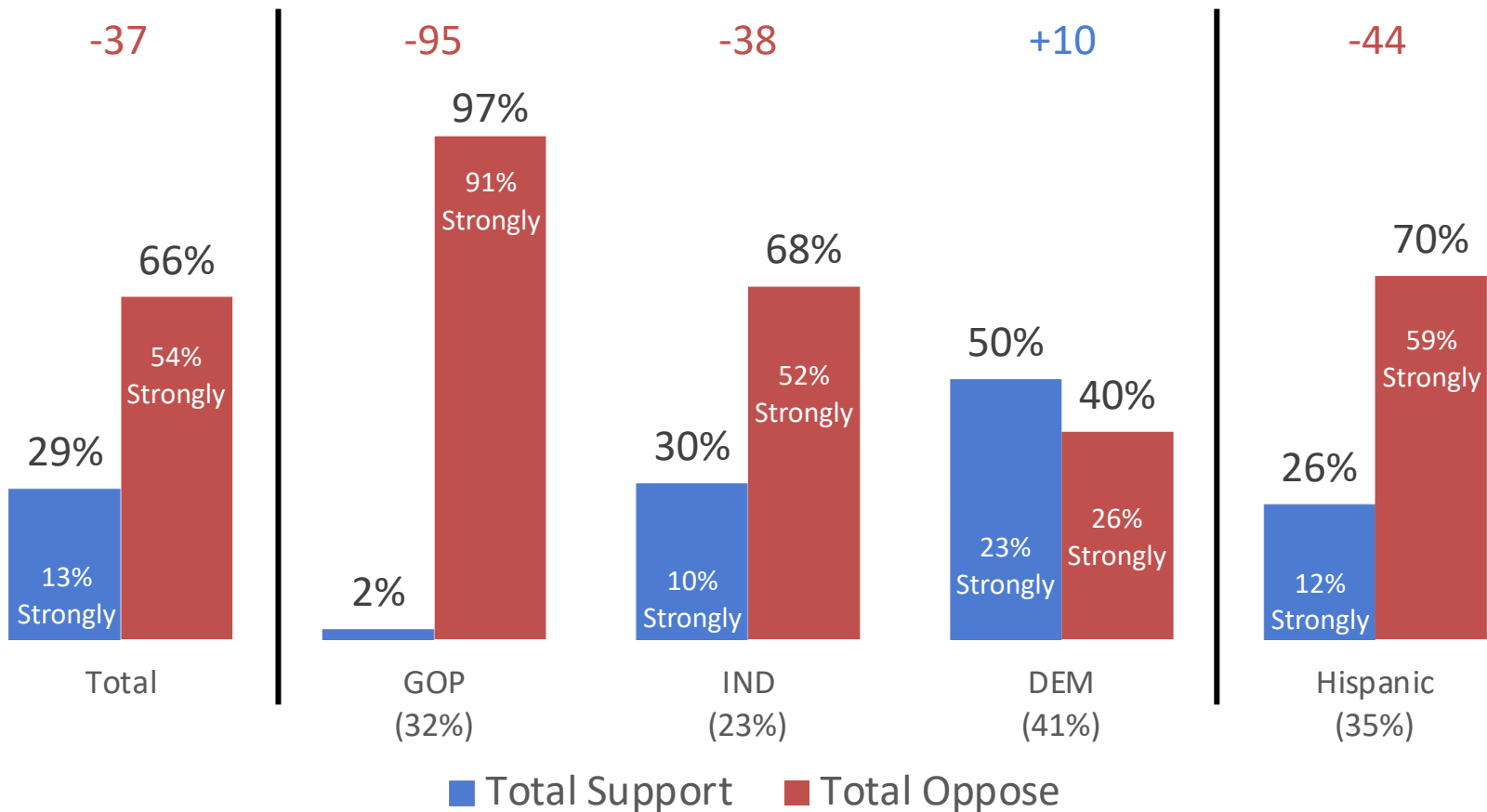
# When asked about Governor Lujan Grisham's efforts to phase out the state's oil and gas industry...
